Toward a White Paper:

Examining Together a First Series of National Measures to Raise the Bar on Quality

Since 2022, each of the 14 interdisciplinary and intersectoral research teams across Canada has conducted activities aimed at better understanding the reasons for and impacts of barriers to quality that are often neglected or poorly integrated into the processes of programming, design and production of the built environment. We have adopted a bottom-up process, calling on the thoughts and experiences of representatives of users and citizens, representatives of public and municipal commissions, and representatives of the professional community, all coordinated by teams of academics and students. These "14 partnership tables" committed themselves to formulating strategies for effective concerted change. These strategies gradually took the form of "14 roadmaps to quality"

We must stress the bottom-up dimension of our partnership approach, which differs from most of the approaches adopted by the national quality policies being developed in several countries, which often take a top-down, global approach

Let us summarize the major milestones of our work, supported by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada since the summer of 2022:

In August 2022, the Montreal convention was inaugural in that it laid the foundations for our work schedule and confirmed the principle of partnership tables. This first face-to-face meeting followed long years marked by the preparation of our research project, but also by the constraints of COVID. The Montreal convention enabled many partners to finally meet, and allowed the 14 research sites to collectively carry out an initial inventory of barriers: in other words, all those obstacles to quality that make our built environments less equitable, less inclusive, less socially relevant and not sufficiently sustainable, or even resilient.

In 2023, the annual convention in Calgary was an opportunity to report not on barriers and blockages, but on an initial set of positive experiences in Canada's built environment. This time, it was a question of thinking quality through experience, rather than conceptually, or in disciplinary, managerial or even expert terms. As a result, the search for the best methods of collecting lived experiences of quality has become a major feature of the 14 projects across Canada. This practice is intended to underpin our understanding of what quality really means in the daily lives of everyone, not just experts. It has to be said, however, that listening to and taking account of lived experience is still far from common practice in the commissioning, design and production of built environments. The same applies to research and training in all disciplines. Where are the users, where are the citizens in our definitions of quality?

In 2024, at the Halifax Convention, partners and participants were invited to report on a positive outcome based on their own experience of the project. After two years of meetings and analysis at local and national levels, it was important to understand how the process had contributed to changing our understanding and definitions of quality. As the built environment is a collective project, and while recognizing that professionals play a decisive role, it was important to open up the black box of processes by reminding designers that they cannot see themselves as the sole points of reference on a roadmap to quality. Between the extremes - of a vague consultation or a process that would be entirely controlled by citizens - we placed the partnership approach in a median space: that of the co-construction of expectations and assessment criteria. Our bottom-up approach, based on interdisciplinary and intersectoral research methods, did not require to confuse partnership for quality with that of co-design. For Halifax 2024, the 14 partner teams were in fact invited to set out their roadmaps in a median space between action and knowledge.

A few months later, at the online convention in November 2024, the teams presented an initial list of actions designed to achieve specific objectives for raising the bar of quality. While some of these actions had already been tested locally, whether at the pedagogical, professional or public commissioning level, at this stage they were all still very much glued to research projects and their inclusion in specific contexts.

For the Toronto 2025 National Quality Convention, as we now move towards the conclusion of the Quality Partnership, two sets of requirements have been considered by all teams in recent months:

- **1.** How do the updated roadmaps already offer strategies for intervention and quality improvement at local level?
- 2. What aspects of the roadmaps could form part of a national quality strategy?

At the University of Toronto, there will be three levels of exposure:

- 1. We've commissioned students in each team to produce short videos outlining the barriers, approaches and specific proposals in the most open way possible, in order to reach the widest possible audience. At the luncheon on May 2, the jury will present the results of the "video competition" we have proposed to stimulate creativity and engagement. All videos will be accessible via our forum: LivingAtlasofQuality.ca.
- **2.** We have asked all teams to summarize the most up-to-date status of their roadmaps in 3 panels, which will be exhibited at the convention in May, and then at the annual meeting of the Royal Architectural Institute of

Canada in June in Montreal. With these new roadmaps, we want to reach out to professional groups - but also to new citizen and community groups - to invite them to contribute to mapping the lived experience of quality in Canada. This is a long-term ambition, which may well extend beyond the scope of our SSHRC project.

3. Finally, and perhaps most importantly at this stage, we will venture to assess a first state of what could become a "white paper on quality" in the form of 48 national actions. During two series of round tables (May 1 and May 2), all the partners and students present will be divided into 8 heterogeneous groups (see breakdown at the end of this program). Each group will review 6 actions per meeting, ideally 12 actions over the two days of the convention. By the end of this process, all the proposed actions should have been read, understood and commented on by at least two groups of around twenty people. That is what we call: **Examining a first series of quality measures together.**

Note that these 48 actions were formulated by not just 14, but 16 groups. The national partners (RHF, RAIC, PSPC, etc.) are now considered the 15th team, while under the impetus of Athabasca University student Trishtina Godoy-Contois, a member of the Métis Nation of Alberta (Red River Métis), a new group of indigenous expertise is emerging at the heart of our shared adventure. It goes by the acronym EIL for Emerging Indigeneous Leaders, and we welcome this initiative with great hope and attention. Following the convention, and taking into account the feedback received from participants, if each of the 16 teams manages to propose the implementation of at least 3 concrete, well-thought-out actions, the resulting white paper will bring together at least 48 ways to change the current situation of the built environment in Canada.

The aim of this White Paper on quality is therefore to provide a detailed list of short, medium- and long-term recommendations for national action to be taken, at educational, professional or public procurement level, with a view to a national strategy for improving quality in the built environment in Canada.

What is an action toward quality?

In the context of a preliminary definition of a white paper for the Toronto convention, an action refers to a concrete, strategic initiative aimed at improving quality and challenging the status quo. While the content and structure of such a white paper will be discussed at the convention (e.g., a white paper on education, a white paper on practice, etc.), it is important to emphasize here that, unlike guidelines that provide general recommendations, an action is a deliberate, transformative process designed to create tangible change.

Actions must be measurable and adaptable to different contexts in order to make significant progress toward improving quality in Canada's built environment. These actions can be developed for educational, professional or governmental situations and processes. As our partnership brings together **four types of actor**, some of the proposed actions may be approached or implemented by at least one of these types of actor: citizen groups, professionals (as well as professional organizations and/or industries), public procurement representatives and academics (including students).

The actions we will be examining have been structured as follows:

- **1.** What is the specific problem or obstacle to quality that your research team has been working on since the beginning of the SSHRC quality partnership?
- **2.** What needs to be done to remove this type of obstacle to quality in the built environment?
- **3.** Who should implement this action and how can they do it?

The program for this important convention includes debates, meetings and visits, as well as conferences and networking opportunities. We'll be delighted to welcome Canadian and international speakers, who will be commenting - and even giving critical feedback - on their own approaches to quality improvement policies and strategies, whether successful or unsuccessful, or ongoing, like ours. Thanks to the generosity of our partners at Toronto Metropolitan University, Professors **Lisa Landrum** and **Marco L. Polo**, we will discover student work and research on the Waterfront over a friendly cocktail.

On behalf of the Governance Board and the Steering Committee, Dimitri joins me in warmly thanking Professors **Rob Wright** and **Fadi Masoud**, and of course the students and administrators of the University of Toronto for graciously welcoming us into an environment, theirs, that is a fine example of excellence in architectural quality.




First Floor Plan







Second Floor Plan


